# Help Us Train More Amazing Volunteers!

In 2014, volunteers donated 9,788 hours, providing respite care, companionship and support to the patients and families we serve.

Volunteers' situations change and they are not all able to give time year after year, so we hold three volunteer classes annually.

The cost for each training class is \$2516 or about \$125 per volunteer. Volunteer care is a hospice Medicare benefit requirement, yet we receive no reimbursement for training.

at the Hospice Alliance House in Pleasant Prairie. When we left – even though I knew the outcome wouldn't change – I felt a peacefulness and comfort.

Some time afterward, I saw a notice in the newspaper that Hospice Alliance volunteer classes were starting. I made a phone call to get more information – with no plan of committing. But the women on the other end of the phone was so gracious, she pretty much had me at "hello".

So I started my volunteer training with very little knowledge of hospice, no medical training and a lot of unsettled feelings about the thought of dying. However, I knew I could offer some basic life skills, including the art of conversation, a warm smile and a hand to hold.

What I have learned is there is an unbelievable amount of care and compassion not only given toward patients, but the family, friends and visitors who also need support during this time. There is great effort to make someone's end-of-life story filled with meaningful moments.

#### Through the tears, the first thing families say...

I have been present in the Hospice House when someone has passed. Through the tears, the first thing families say is "thank you, thank you so very much." They are so grateful to have had our support.

Volunteer experiences like this are truly "works of the heart," and I am honored to be a part of them.

Thanks to your support,
Hospice Alliance has been
chosen as a 2015 Hospice Honors
elite recipient. Hospice Honors
elite is the highest award given
for providing the highest level
of satisfaction through care as
measured by family caregivers.

The award is based on results from the Family Evaluation Hospice Care (FEHC) survey. More than 1,700 hospices participate, but only 2% in the country were awarded elite status. Hospice Alliance was the *only provider* in Wisconsin to earn this most prestigious award.

Hospice Honors *elite* recognition is awarded only to hospices scoring above the national average on every single question on satisfaction surveys that go to the families of every single patient.

"We've worked incredibly hard this past year to make our already great care reach this higher level of excellence," Rita Hagen, Executive Director, said. "Changes can be difficult and we've made many. We've improved processes, introduced new technology and held tight to rigorous training schedules."

"It's gratifying for our entire staff to know these improvements are recognized and greatly appreciated by the families we serve," Hagen said.
