Afterward, guests were invited inside Founder's Hall to enjoy refreshments and the music of


violinist Charelle Brown. They could also view the Memorial Slideshow and add a loved one's name to the new Memory Tree.

66 Deople in America think that I hospice is sad, but that isn't true," Ria van Heijningen, a Hospice Alliance volunteer explains.

In Holland, where Ria was born and lived until 1992, care for the dying, especially in nursing homes

was "not good." She considers the Hospice House a peaceful place and looks forward to the two-hour shifts she volunteers.

preparing meals and sitting at the bedside of patients.

"We volunteers don't walk around with sad faces. If a family member is feeling down, I give an extra cookie and a hug," Ria says. "I like talking to the patients and reading them peaceful things, even if they can't talk to me."

Since English is a second language for her, Ria is working on a journal of peaceful quotes so she has the right words to comfort the patients she visits. Like most Hospice Alliance volunteers, Ria became aware of our great need for volunteers through the loss of a loved one.

> "When my husband got sick in 2011, and was a patient with Hospice Alliance in our home, I realized there are

people who are dying at home alone. I thought that was awful," Ria says.

"My philosophy is, when something is awful, I want to do my part to make it better. It's emotional, but not hard. Giving another person a warm hand to hold makes a difference, and everyone deserves that at the end of life."
