✧ Connections – Planting Seeds of Hope A Children's Grief Support Group

Last fall, Hospice Alliance introduced Connections – Planting Seeds of Hope, a support group for kids and their trusted grown up. Groups are offered on the third Thursday of each month from 5:30 p.m. – 7:45 p.m. at Hospice Alliance. Children ages two to eighteen are welcome, and each must be accompanied by an adult. An all-community offered resource, the support group is not limited to families with loved ones who received end-of-life care with Hospice Alliance.

“We saw a need that was going unmet, so we decided to fulfill the need,” said Rita Hagen, Hospice Alliance, Executive Director, “We are constantly seeking ways to provide services, not only for our patients and their families at end-of-life, but also after they experience loss. Our grief support programs have always been available to any adult in need. Now we are able to offer bereavement services to children as well.”

The program is managed by Jennifer Sytkowski, Bereavement Coordinator, Hospice Alliance, and a team of trained volunteers who function as facilitators and assistants. The curriculum and activities involved are developmentally appropriate as children will be grouped by age.

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On a sunny August evening, families gathered in the Hospice House Garden to create a custom designed terra cotta pot and plant a seedling of their choosing in memory of a loved one lost.

Dear Supporters of Hospice Alliance,
When I'm in the community sharing the benefits of Hospice Alliance's hospice and palliative care, people are surprised if I only focus briefly on what people think of as "medical" care – our nurses, our certified nursing assistants (many who have spent decades serving our patients), the items reviewed by The Joint Commission and Medicare reimburses.

Oftentimes, I spend my time sharing the AMAZING services that we are able to provide because of gifts and donations from our supporters and grants from our community service organizations and groups. We offer a robust grief support program, available to anyone in the community. We offer Music Therapy to patients on service and groups at our area Assisted Living and Skilled Nursing Homes.

Most recently, we created a position: "Life Enrichment Coordinator." As we witnessed the ramifications of the safety measures put in place by the pandemic, and identified an opportunity to remedy the effects, we grew our programming. In partnership with over 30 Assisted Living and Skilled Nursing Facilities and other area senior-gathering locations, we host engaging and joyful interactive events including skill-appropriate exercise, game show themed programs and sing-alongs.

At Hospice Alliance, not only are we committed to our patients and their families, but our entire community. And we are proud to partner with our supporters to "add life to days."
