He ventured to Lake Tomahawk, spending time fishing and enjoying the sights and sounds of the Northwoods. His trip made possible due to a travel contract our team helped to set up – where hospices connect to ensure resources are available outside the "home" hospice's footprint.

But the best road trip of all was an old stomping grounds tour of Door County. Harry had built a place in Peninsula Center when his kids were young, and they enjoyed spending days creating memories. This time, with his daughter at the wheel, they ventured by the old "barn" for the last time together.

They logged stops to reconnect with old Racine friends who moved on to Ellison Bay and Baileys Harbor. They tucked into Pebble Beach in Sister Bay to breathe in its peace and beauty, and spent time surveying the bass and panfish population in Kangaroo Lake.

Riding down North Bay Shore Drive they pointed out the goats munching lunch on the roof of Al Johnson's, as if surprised. The memories, some shared for the hundredth time and some for the very first, were only made sweeter with a stop at Wilson's for ice cream.
